### Keeping the Faith: Suz's Monthly Message

My Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

What follows is the full statement I intended to deliver at the Annual Meeting. Following on the other reports, much of it seemed redundant at the time. For those of you who weren't there, I believe this summarizes our meeting nicely:

We've been together now for just over 7.5 months. I believe that God brought us together for a purpose, and as we continue to discern and move toward that purpose, I experience two feelings very deeply: joy and gratitude. Joy is more than moments of happiness. Joy is a state of being that underlies those moments and sustains us through the times between those moments. Joy is grounded in the unity we have in Christ and is the vine from which we branch out and bear fruit.

Our unity is lived in our worship of the Risen Lord, in our formation into His likeness, in our care for one another and for our world. These four marks of our unity have been spoken of today, and there are very complete reports of the fruits of that unity available for you to read. There is much here for us to celebrate and for which to offer thanks.

That brings us to the gratitude that I have for so many signs of health and wholeness here at Holy Trinity. The Shalom that Jesus brings is very much a part of the life of this parish. Because you have answered the call to follow Jesus, we have much good news to share whenever we're together.

Our worship is enhanced by the ministries of our readers, intercessors, acolytes, Eucharistic Ministers, and our choir—our choir rehearses a couple of hours each week, in addition to leading our music. I am grateful to all of you who contribute to the leadership of worship.

The Altar Guild puts in many hours of preparation for our services, especially at Christmas and Easter. The Worship Committee brings all the worship support groups together to coordinate the work that goes into each service. I am grateful to all of you who work quietly and diligently behind the scenes.

I am grateful for those who provide transportation to parishioners who can no longer drive themselves. I am grateful for the Eucharistic Visitors who take communion to those who can't get here. I'm especially grateful for parents who get their kids up and dressed and go through the struggle of getting here on time or 5 minutes late. I know that struggle, the struggle IS real, and am grateful that you go through that so that your families can enrich our unity in Christ.

I am grateful for all those who contribute to our formation for children, youth, and adults—our Sunday School teachers, Children's Church volunteers, our nursery workers, and leaders of E/M and book study groups, and those who help me listen to the Holy spirit in Bible studies. I am grateful for those who plan for and execute our fellowship opportunities, and for the kitchen angels who keep us fed on Sunday mornings and Wednesday nights for Canterbury, and for all the other times we gather to break bread.

I am grateful for those who keep our buildings and grounds so beautifully, for those who work tirelessly to maximize the revenue from our parking empire. I am grateful for those who have given sacrificially of your time, energy, and money to make such monumental progress in paying down the debt on Trinity Place, which is so much more than the parking lot next door. Donations and pledges to our Prism fund continue to come in, even though the campaigns have passed their completion dates.

Because of the amazing generosity of this parish, we have sent over \$65,000 to Haiti this year, primarily to cover the cost of students there who, God willing, will go on to contribute greatly to the needs of their neighbors. The ECW Bazaar raised over \$11,000 for local Outreach projects, and the Vestry allocated \$15,000 in addition to the SOM allocation for Outreach. Holy Trinity is embarking on partnerships in local schools, the beginning of which is the Shoe Drive fundraiser for Clemson Elementary PTA. Look for more hands-on opportunities to make a difference in local schools soon.

I am grateful for all these things, and for so many more that I could talk for another hour. But I won't. Instead, let's stand, find a way to hold a hand, as we pray the prayer our Lord taught to his disciples and has been a sign of unity ever since: *Our Father, who art in heaven...*

## Fat Tuesday Celebration

What is "Fat Tuesday"? Fat Tuesday is the traditional name for the day before Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent in the Western Christian churches, including the Roman Catholic Church and Protestant churches. Fat Tuesday is more commonly known as Mardi Gras, which is simply Fat Tuesday in French.

Pancakes are associated with the day preceding Lent because they were a way to use up rich foods such as eggs, milk, and sugar before the fasting season of the 40 days of Lent. The liturgical fasting emphasized eating plainer food and refraining from food that would give pleasure: in many cultures, this means no meat, dairy products, or eggs. So, Fat Tuesday has come to be celebrated as the last feast before the Lenten fast.

Hap Wheeler and his band of merry men will be cooking up our traditional pancakes and bacon, while Bill Purkerson will be coordinating Bingo for everyone beginning at 6:45 pm. 

## ANNUAL MEETING







Come and join the fun March 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> as we head for the mountains for a few days of learning, fellowship and fun. There will be activities for all ages and time to just relax or take a nap.

Master storyteller Tracy Rodosevic will be joining us again to present *Narrative Networking in a Wired World: Continuing to Connect Through Story Telling, Story Hearing and Story Sharing*. Don't miss this chance to learn more about yourself and those around you. Tracy is a fabulous program leader. This year's program will highlight aspects of our current digital age as one with a myriad of opportunities to connect with others, sharing our stories and learning more about each other. But there's also nothing quite like good ol' eyeball-to-eyeball sharing! Our time together will consist of exploring ways to best communicate in a post-literate age, a time when (perhaps surprisingly) traditional storytelling and digital storytelling are quite comfortable with each other and can be used, in partnership, to make powerful connections with those we know well as well as those we've never met.

The middle and high school youth traditionally stay together in a cottage with chaperones and have a special program and activities. Additionally, our youngest parishioners including kindergarten through 5<sup>th</sup> grade will have their own programming and a nursery will be provided during the adult programming.

The Kanuga Weekend is a special time for our parish to reconnect, renew our spirits and have great fun together. There will be many opportunities to laugh, to talk, to meet new friends and to reconnect with old ones. You are free to walk around the grounds and the lake, snooze before the fire, or explore Hendersonville. Meals will be served in the dining hall, but there will also be a social hour each evening, a bonfire with s'mores and music, Compline and a service as well as a Eucharist on Sunday morning. You are free to do as much or as little as you desire. We will offer some special opportunities for those seeking a Sabbath rest, including an afternoon hike, a late evening walk through the labyrinth, or tea and cookies by the fire.

**Registration is due by February 8, 2017.** The adult fee for the entire weekend is \$165 per person. An \$85 supplement fee will be added for those preferring a single occupancy room. *We offer all children of the parish the chance to attend the weekend at no charge if they are accompanied by a parent.* We want this weekend to be affordable for everyone so scholarships are available. 

**February 26 in the Parish Hall:** Introduction to the SHIFT: Three Big moves for the 21st Century Church, a 10-week program for small groups to explore the challenges and promises of being Church in the 21st Century. This program is designed to “provide spiritual direction for those of us who want to make the personal and faith community shifts necessary to partner with God” as we seek God's kingdom “on earth as it is in heaven.” We'll be asking three big questions as we work through the SHIFT. Come find out what those questions are...and how your thinking can be transformed by asking them.



## CARE OF PEOPLE

### Highlights of Health Research\*



Unless otherwise stated, the results below were reported by only one study during the time period given above; it is possible that similar findings may have been reported at other times. If you cannot locate a study in the literature, contact me (marymartof@gmail.com.). Suggestions for this column are welcome.

Life Expectancy—Life expectancy for Americans decreased to 78.8 years in 2015. It was the first drop since 1993.

Cardio-respiratory Fitness and Brain Activity—Older adults who had high scores on cardio-respiratory fitness had increased brain activity and memory performance compared with those with low scores. Cardio-respiratory fitness can be increased through regular, moderate to vigorous activities; such as walking, swimming, or jogging.

Heart Disease—1. Heart disease decreased by 20% from 1983 to 2011 due to risk factor prevention and improved detection.  
2. Subjects were followed over 11 years. The study found that those who were more pessimistic were twice as likely to die of heart disease when compared with those who were the least pessimistic.

Stroke—Hospitals that treat a higher volume of stroke patients have lower repeat strokes and mortality rates.

Blood Pressure—A review of 19 clinical trials by meta-analysis revealed that lowering blood pressure significantly reduces the incidence of stroke, heart attack, albuminuria, and progression of retinopathy.

Heart Failure—Adults (45-55) without high blood pressure, diabetes mellitus, or obesity had as much as an 86% decreased risk of heart failure in their lives.

Asthma—Children born in communities with more air pollution were more likely to develop asthma than those born in communities with cleaner air.

Colorectal Cancer and Processed Meat—The World Health Organization stated that it has NOT suggested that people never eat processed meat but rather that decreasing consumption decreases the risk of colorectal cancer.

E-cigarettes—People using e-cigarettes had a 30% increased risk of breathing problems, compared with non-users. A second study of adolescents revealed that users had double the odds of developing chronic respiratory problems; such as bronchitis, congestion, phlegm, and persistent cough.

Cancer Treatment—1. Two studies showed that women who had surgery and chemotherapy shortly following the diagnosis of breast cancer had better odds of survival than those who waited 30 days.

2. Regular use of aspirin following diagnosis of prostate cancer was linked to a 39% reduction in mortality (death) risk.

Skin Cancer—The incidence of melanoma has increased since 2009. Protection from the harmful effects of the sun is essential in prevention.

Hearing Loss—Women who used ibuprofen or acetaminophen for at least 6 years had an increased risk of self-reported hearing loss compared with those who used the drugs for less than 1 year. No risk was found for the usual dose of aspirin.

Folic Acid and Birth Defects—The U. S. preventive Services Task Force has recommended that women of child-bearing age take 400-800 micrograms of folic acid supplements daily in order to decrease the risk of birth defects.

We have some mixed hardy greens growing, which will be ready to begin to harvest in a week or so; help yourself. We also have some Austrian winter peas, whose new leaves are wonderful additions to salads. We planted them, along with forage radishes, to help with our soil. And, in big news, we have some oyster mushrooms showing themselves along our mushroom log "row."

We will be planning a planting day in the next 6 weeks or so. Let us know what you wish to see us grow this year!


