KEEPING THE FAITH: SUZ'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

My Dear Friends in Christ,

The glory of Christmas is still shining brightly, the carols are still ringing sweetly, and the twelve days of Christmastide have just begun as I write this. Our Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services brought me once more to my knees in response to the joy and awe and wonder of Emmanuel, God-with-us. I know from past experience that staying tuned in to the meaning of the season will grow increasingly difficult as the days go by and everyone's attention turns to plans for celebrating the New Year before returning to work and school. This year, I'm going to try to bring Emmanuel into my plans and resolutions for 2020. I hope that each of you will do the same.

My one resolution for the New Year will be to spend Quiet Time with God every day. Each day, I will set aside at least a few minutes to renew my relationship with God, who is as close and as constant as every breath. There are a variety of practices to deepen and strengthen one's awareness of God-with-us. My final project for one of my classes this summer is a program for introducing those practices to vestries and congregations. I will be sharing this program, called "Be Transformed: A Holy Experiment" with you in the space in this newsletter that has previously been called "Why Do We Do That?"

Each month, I will share with you a spiritual practice to try out for a month. I have a workbook that you may use to keep a record of your experience of each practice. Please contact me directly if you wish to receive a copy of the workbook, which I can provide in either electronic or hard copy. I will also offer a mini-workshop on each practice the second Sunday of each month during the Sunday School hour (except March, when we have our Kanuga retreat). I will also engage in these practices in the transept chapel each Monday morning, beginning at 11:15 am and finishing by 11:45 am. Please do join me, if you schedule allows, for this Quiet Time with God.

The spiritual growth of the parish is an essential characteristic of a healthy congregation, and we will be well-served by attending to our own spiritual vitality. Regular exercise of our spiritual muscles holds the promise of increased formation of the bonds of community for the fulfilling of our mission, enfolded in the embrace of our Creator, accompanied by our Redeemer, and guided by the Holy Spirit. Please join me in this holy experiment, and we will be transformed by the renewing of our minds.

BE TRANSFORMED: A HOLY EXPERIMENT

African Bible Study Method-lectio divina in Community*

This Bible study method was introduced at the Lambeth Conference, a gathering of bishops of the Anglican Communion. It is known by both names: "Lambeth" and "African." It is helpful to use a variety of translations of the passage. In steps 3, 6, and 9 there is no discussion of the insights that are shared—the intent is to listen closely to what each person says and to accept it without comment.

Lectio divina means, quite simply "holy reading." *Lectio divina* encompasses a variety of methods for reading our Holy Scriptures prayerfully, with the intention of listening for the Word (the mind, the will, the person of God in Jesus Christ) in our hearts, minds, and imaginations. In listening, it is always important to pay attention to physical sensations, "random" thoughts, and emotional responses to what we are hearing.

Opening Prayer: O Blessed Lord, who caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning. Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our savior Jesus Christ. *Amen.*

- 1. Read the passage slowly.
- 2. Identify word or phrase that catches their attention (1 minute).
- 3. Each shares the word or phrase around the group (3-5 minutes, no discussion).
- 4. Another person reads the passage slowly (from a different translation if possible).
- 5. Each person identifies where this passage touches their life today (1 minute).
- 6. Each shares (3-5 minutes, no discussion).
- 7. Passage is read a third time (another reader and translation if possible).
- 8. Each person names or writes "From what I've heard and shared, what do I believe God wants me to do or be? Is God inviting me to change in any way?" (5 minutes)
- 9. Each person shares their answer (5-10 minutes, no discussion)

Each prays for the person on their right, naming what was shared in the other steps (5 minutes).

Close with the Lord's Prayer.

*This method of lectio divina may be adapted quite easily for individual use by responding to each reading in writing. It is important, however, to read the Scripture passage aloud.

Depolarizing with Better Angels:

January 25, 2020 from 9 am—4:30 pm at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church

We had a bountiful evening with our Better Angels Gathering in November at the Parish House and we are most grateful to the Pastoral Care Committee for their help in getting the word out and helping with sign in, set up and clean up. About thirty people joined us to watch the documentary on Better Angels. We have heard from some who were sorry they couldn't attend but wanted to. In January, we are offering another opportunity for a different type of Better Angels experience.

The work of Better Angels is about peace during our deeply divided era. It is about hope, civility, kindness and learning to talk and listen with respect to our neighbors who may have a perspective different than ours. It is about living with the joy, love and peace that our families long to return to.

You can learn more about the mission of Better Angels at **www.better-angels.org** and view one of the videos about this national grassroots organization and our goal to depolarize our country one community at a time.

You are invited to a Red/Blue Workshop on January 25 from 9 am to 4:30 pm at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church. The Clemson Area Better Angels is partnering with the Pastoral Care Committee at Holy Trinity for this event which will bring together a maximum of about 30 people: 7 conservative-leaning (red) people and 7 liberal-leaning (blue) people for a structured exploration of political views with 2 trained moderators and about 15 observers for a day-long event. Participants are encouraged to speak openly about their political beliefs and to listen attentively the other side in order to find areas of common ground. Our workshops offer a respectful environment to foster true communication and understanding.

Abraham Lincoln's first inaugural speech in 1861 just prior to the Civil War certainly described the state of the country then *and* it describes ours today.

We are not enemies, but friends. We must not be enemies. Though passion may have strained, it must not break our bonds of affection. The mystic chords of memory...will yet swell the chorus of the Union, when again touched, as surely they will be, by the better angels of our nature.

We are the Better Angels! We MUST BE Better Angels!

Attendance was down—whether to the date being moved and folks not realizing that fact or to the unrelenting rain that fell all day, we do not know.

Those who attended were delighted with items from local crafters (handmade jewelry, wreaths, and more), gift baskets (wonderful themed baskets that are ready for giving), baked goods (including homemade jams, jellies, and chocolates), plants (including many from the parish grounds), Holy Trinity crafts (handmade items including American Girl doll clothing, linens, traditional church mice plus a special edition Clemson cheerleader mouse, knitted items, Clemson and festive banners and customized heirloom knit Christmas stockings for pre-order, Holy Trinity items (stained glass window ornaments and note cards), St. Paul's Thrift Shop (unique gifts and frozen meals), Haitian Artisans (variety of gifts available from skilled artisans), a delicious lunch (homemade soups, salads, quiche, and more), and a silent auction (featuring local artwork, area retailers, and Clemson artwork).

A huge thank you to everyone in the parish who contributed to the success of the 2019 Bazaar and Artisan market.

As of December 16, 2019 we have net proceeds of \$8,882.04. Last year we donated every dime (except for diocesan dues) of net proceeds (\$10,609.57) but this year we plan to retain \$882.04 for stocking and other expenses that will arise before the next event. Thus we will donate \$8,000.00 To local charities this year.

We will have an ECW meeting, hopefully sometime this month, to vote on the charities to which we will donate. The date will be announced later in *HT Notes*.

We are also seeking volunteers and ideas for next year's Bazaar. 
