### Keeping the Faith—It Ain't Easy Being Purple

#### Dear Friends in Christ,

As we prepare to move into the purple season of Lent, let's continue the theme of my parish address at our Annual Meeting and consider what it means to be a purple congregation. That is what we are—a congregation that encompasses many perspectives and many persuasions. This is one of the great strengths of The Episcopal Church and one of the great challenges. Every Sunday, people sit in the same pew with someone who voted differently than they did in November. Every Sunday, people share Holy Communion with someone who has different understandings of human sexuality than they do. Every Sunday, people pass the peace with someone who holds different beliefs about war, what constitutes injustice, or who is deserving of welcome. This happens at Holy Trinity every Sunday.

What an amazing and wonderful thing this is! It is amazing because there are so few spaces left in this world where so much differing opinion and conviction can coexist without vitriol and damaged relationships. It is wonderful for a couple of reasons. First, this coexistence makes it possible for true understanding to develop. It takes a lot of hard work and rare trust to get there, but as long as we are all in the same room and treating each other with love and respect, there is hope. Second, this purpling is wonderful because it points to the unifying power of grace in a community founded in the love of God, the freedom we have in Jesus Christ, and the life that is poured into us by the Holy Spirit. We are able to share our lives, despite differences and in the face of strong pressure from a divisive culture, with God's help.

Worshiping together, praying together, working together, *studying the Bible together* are all unifying practices that transcend the cultural divides that otherwise separate if we allow them to. If you have not yet made a commitment to join parishioners and Episcopalians around the diocese in reading the Bible this year, I encourage you to do so now. This practice of studying our Holy Scriptures in a learning community is foundational to the formation of each Christian—a process that is never completed in this life. We offer a number of groups that already exist, and I would be happy to assist in forming others if that is needed. St. Paul wrote in his letter to the Romans, "Don't be conformed to the patterns of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds so that you can figure out what God's will is--what is good and pleasing and mature." (Romans 12:2, Common English Bible) The most certain way to achieve this goal is by studying, praying, and learning together with other believers. The best text for transforming and renewing our minds is the Bible. Why not join a Bible study today and give it a year? What have you got to lose? **Much love**, Suz+

#### January 2025 Tempo Financial Report Bob Taylor, Treasurer

Holy Trinity had a good 2024 Financial Year. Income and expenses remained close to budget throughout the year. For 2024 total income exceeded total expenses by \$8,177.78. The following table provides additional detailed summaries of the 2024 financial year:

Programs and missions were adequately funded and no major expenses to the Operating budget occurred. Thus, Holy Trinity arrives at the start of 2025 positioned to move forward financially with growth in programs and missions and is prepared financially for the assistant priest position.

As tax season approaches, parishioners are reminded of the tax advantages of having donations to Holy Trinity transferred from tax deferred funds without being declared as income (and hence, not subject to income taxes). This benefit is available even for non-itemized tax returns. This transfer is particularly useful in reducing required minimum distributions of tax-deferred funds which are taxable when distributed. Interested parishioners should consult with a tax advisor or financial institution for more information. In many cases, the transfer can be easily done online.

#### Seasonal Notes for Lent, Holy Week, and Easter

The seasons of the church year are designed to help Christians be formed into the likeness of Christ. The moods, themes, rituals, prayers, and Scriptures that mark each season and each big liturgical event of the year help to provide aides for living fully into the practices of the church in support of that formation. Lent and Easter encompass both the most solemn and the most joyful occasions marked by our liturgical calendar. March and the Lenten Season begin almost simultaneously this year.

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of this season of healing, which we observe for forty days (not counting Sundays) leading up to Easter. Ash Wednesday is a very solemn occasion, on which we are reminded of our mortality and our need for repentance. Lent is the time which we are invited to observe "by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

Our worship services will reflect the somber, but hopeful, tenor of the season. On Ash Wednesday, we will offer several opportunities to participate in the Proper Liturgy of the Day. On Sundays in Lent, we will begin our worship services either with the Great Litany (BCP 148) or the Penitential Order, which is found just prior to the Rite One and Rite Two forms for Holy Eucharist (BCP 319 or 351). Alleluias are omitted during the Season of Lent, and contemplative silence will be more evident in our Sunday services.

Holy Week is sometimes considered to be a season unto itself, and there is certainly an increased intensity in the themes and tone of the week that begins with Palm Sunday and culminates in the Triduum, the three holy days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and the glorious Easter Vigil. This year, Easter is almost as late as it can be, which poses some challenges for timing of the Easter Vigil and Sunrise service.

The Church offers the observances of Ash Wednesday, Lent, and Holy Week in preparation for Easter joy. The more fully we are able to participate in these observances, with solemn attention paid to the healing benefits of the practices of Lent, the greater our capacity for embracing the joy of resurrection. Please, come and see for yourself this Lenten season! We've included the schedule for our special services at the end of the newsletter so that it can be posted in a convenient location.

### So All May Eat!



Despite a summer drought and several bug infestations, we were able to grow and donate 709 pounds of fresh produce to Clemson Community Care dur-

ing 2024. According to Farmer Mike, who leads our efforts in the SAME (So All May Eat) Garden, this represents a small increase over the 682 pounds we produced and donated in 2023.





The SAME Garden, located on the grounds of Trinity Place just outside our Parish Hall, was founded by the late Beth Kunkel, a devoted parishioner at Holy Trinity, who passed away in November of 2022. From its inception, Beth's garden of raised beds produced herbs, tomatoes, squash, bell peppers, carrots, okra, and more to help those in need in our community.

Spring is coming soon, and we will be looking for volunteers to help plant, tend, water, and grow a new crop of vegetables. #### The most important two developments reported for the year 2024

**at CCDC:** We have approved a plan and signed a contract to convert our toddler and our pre-K playgrounds into Certified Outdoor Learning Environments that will meet the new, rigorous ABC requirements for an A+ rated school. Even with lots of volunteer labor, etc., it is going to cost about \$200,000. The other big push involves our entire staff being trained in Conscious Discipline, which, if used consistently, leads children to make better choices and to be more helpful and kind. But it begins

with the adults, who will learn to consciously manage our own thoughts and emotions so we can help children learn to do the same. It teaches the lifelong skill of self-regulation that empowers the child to build healthy connections with others. We truly believe this training will provide teachers the tools they need to work with a generation of children affected by their arrival during the pandemic years. A lot of these kids have delayed communication skills, and they lack empathy and basic preschool readiness because of the circumstances of their earliest experiences. With Conscious Discipline, we think we can get them caught up in time to be successful in grade school and beyond. CCDC's commitment to Conscious Discipline training is over 3-5 years, with each year costing about \$30,000.



### **Liturgical Ministry Training in March**



For three Sundays in March, Mtr. Suz will be conducting ministry training following the 10:30 service. Please let her know if you are interested in attending a training session, so that sufficient training materials and licensing applications will be available. scate@holytrinityclemson.org or 864-364-1952

**Eucharistic Visitor** training will take place on **Sunday, March 2**, in the Tom Davis Library following the 10:30 service. Eucharistic Visitors (EV) take communion to those who are unable for good

reason to join us in church. This is a licensed ministry, meaning that the Diocesan Office sets the standards and guidelines for this ministry and issues licenses for those who will serve in this capacity. Safe Church training is also required for this ministry.

**Eucharistic Minister** training will take place on **Sunday, March 9**, in the Nave following the 10:30 service. Eucharistic Ministers (EM) serve at the altar during eucharistic services, primarily presenting the cup at communion, but also assisting as the altar is set during the service or carrying the processional cross. This is a licensed ministry (see the description above). Safe Church training is also required for this ministry.

Lector/Intercessor training will take place on Sunday, March 15, in the Nave following the 10:30 service. Lectors read the lessons appointed for the service, and Intercessors read the Prayers of the People. There is no licensing or further training required for this ministry.

#### **Lenten Devotional and Soup Suppers**

This year we are once again offering Lenten Devotional booklets from Living Compass Spirituality and Wellness Initiative, an organization that is committed to "outfitting individuals, families, congregations, and organizations with tools and training for the journey toward wellness and wholeness." This year's devotional theme is Cultivating the Fruit of the Spirit In Heart, Soul, Strength, and Mind. Daily reflections are provided, drawing on the wisdom and insight of a variety of leaders in The Episcopal Church. Each Monday will set the weekly theme related to one fruit of the Spirit. On Wednesdays, we will be introduced to a contemplative spiritual practice.

This year, at Holy Trinity we will gather in the parish hall at 5:30 on Wednesday evenings to enjoy a soup supper and table talk to share personal reflections and insights that emerge in response to the readings. **We** will begin serving soup promptly at 5:30, and we will begin the table talk as soon after that as possible so that our choir members can participate before choir practice.





# **Holy Trinity Receives Extraordinary Gift in Memory of Beth Kunkel**



Beth Kunkel was a dynamic presence at Holy Trinity for many years, serving in many capacities. Her spiritual and practical legacy includes the SAME Garden, which she organized and re-established at Trinity Place, as well as many other ministries that she supported. When she passed into glory in 2022, her financial legacy at Holy Trinity was substantial. Now that legacy has grown, thanks to a recent gift received in her honor.

This anonymous donation of \$100,000 was used as a principal only payment on the twenty-year 2020 Trinity Place Loan. This principal only payment immediately reduced the outstanding balance on the loan from \$568,531.90 to \$468,531.90. Equally important, the principal only payment of \$100,000 shorten the payoff date of the loan by 13 months, from December 2030 to November 2029 and saved \$19,026.99 in mortgage interest on the loan. Surely Beth is smiling down from her heavenly garden!



Holy Trinity Artisan Market and Bazaar wrap up

Dear Holy Trinity Family,

Last year the ECW made a decision to use Bazaar proceeds to support two local food banks which support the Tri-County area as well as fund scholarship money for families who choose to use our Episcopal Day School for their young children. The commitment was for 3 years. This choice was an effort to provide sustaining financial resources to a set number of charities for a set period of time.

On behalf of the ECW, I am pleased to report that the 2024 Bazaar raised \$11,000. This is a 26% increase over last year!

Funds will be allocated as follows:

Clemson Community Care \$6,000.00 Golden Corner Food Bank \$3,000.00 Episcopal Day School Scholarships \$2,000.00
